I wish that this kind of spirit that Filipinos have will also be the spirit that every Christian and Seventh-day Adventist around the world has.

Q: You mentioned that witnessing is a big aspect of Revival and Christian Life. Would you please expound it?

A: By witnessing, a person's faith is strengthened. Ellen White said, "God

could have reached His object in saving sinners without our aid; but in order for us to develop a character like Christ's, we must share in His work." By sharing and by involvement in evangelism or in witnessing, we can be closer to revival.

Q: What advice could you give the delegates?

A: We need to pray more, study more and support one another. We also need to have love – love to God and love to one another. Love is the summary, the center of our spiritual growth. When we love God, we can enjoy fellowship and commune with Him. By that, we can love one another.

Today's plenary session is more about the importance of personal ministry. Elder Kuntaraf related his conversion story, signifying that each of us has significant gifts and talents to offer, and to contribute to the conversion of other people. We ought to work individually and yet as a church; for we are the body of Christ.

My mama was confined in a hospital the night of Mother's Day, May 11. Last week, I was tormented. My mother's health case gave me a great dilemma. Last year, when my father passed away on December, she told me that she felt she might die this year. I was torn. I've lost three loving family members for the last three years in a quick succession, I don't know if I would be able to survive another death in the family.

On the brink of despair, I planned to cancel my trip to MVC for the Congress, and go to our province instead, to take care of my mother. But she insisted that I should go for my mission, God will take care of her. She's always been supportive, selfless and loving. Providentially, she was discharged on the day of my flight, May 16.

God's love is indeed greater than a mother's love, even stronger than death! This is the love that constrains me, empowers me and renews my faith for the Blessed Hope.

Furthermore, miracles happen! Being here in the SSD-wide SS/PM Congress, serving as one of the volunteers is one of those!
